Carmichael HART Celebrates Student Buddy Ministry

HART volunteers, students, family members and supporters gathered at Gibbons Park in Carmichael in early June for a Bar-B-Q celebration of the 2020-21 school year. During the year, adult "buddies" followed COVID-19 guidelines to share lunch with students most every week. Their goal is to provide supportive, nurturing relationships with youngsters who often don't have permanent housing. In the past two years, HART has been training mentors who also must be certified by the San Juan Unified School District. Mentors typically commit to meeting with mainly middle school students for an hour or more per week. Their goal is to improve a student's self concept, social skills, learning capacity and life goals. They also seek to support families' overall competence, self-sufficiency and child-rearing skills. Carmichael HART plans to expand the Student Buddy Program next fall. The school district also is interested in expanding the program to other HART communities.

"April Showers! And a Shot!"

Spring has sprung with Citrus Heights HART's "April Showers! And a Shot!" event as they welcomed dozens of unsheltered neighbors during the week of April 26th thru April 30th. During the 5 day event guests were able to shower, rest, visit with navigator Toni Morgan, have a hot meal and a nutritious to-go meal as well as have the opportunity to receive the COVID-19 vaccine.

Citrus Heights HART sends their thanks to Pastor Greg Kaiser and **Antelope Road Christian Fellowship** who continue to open their opens and shower on these occasions to truly make a difference in the health and wellbeing of people experiencing homelessness in the Citrus Heights area.

The residents of **Grace House** prepared and served over a 100 meals during the 4 hours each weekday. They also offered clothing, encouragement, companionship, and demonstrated to many guests that a path out of homelessness is not walked alone.

Toni Morgan, the Citrus Heights Navigator, visited every day and reported that she was able to interview 10 people and actually complete an initial intake for 9 new clients. 3 folks are on track for housing: one to transitional housing and two for a rehab program. Toni was also able to meet with existing clients to check on progress they have made to replace IDs, Social Security cards, and work on their resumes.

Sgt. Seth Cimino and CHPD were supportive of the event and ensured the

safety of the ARCF campus. Officer Cox and Counselor Carol picked up a guest from the Greenback/Binet Drive area. This guest was able to shower, receive new clothing and hospitality as well as a blanket and two days of food. Officer Cox then returned and drove the guest back to his preferred spot.

Dignity Health filled a unique and important role in offering the vaccine. Ms. Josie Espino RN and pharmacists, Mr. Jim Walsh and Mr. Wil Giang, put the guests at ease and were truly thoughtful and considerate as they administered the vaccinations. 14 single-shot vaccines were given to community members.

Citrus Heights HART also extends a special "Thank You" to volunteers, **Ms. Kay Brown** and **Snackman Alfred Sanchez** for hitting the streets in the weeks leading up to the event, handing out invitations and flyers to unsheltered neighbors.

During the 73 visits by guests - certain supplies including hygiene items, shoes, solar device charges, laundry cards - were offered to help their neighbors. Everyone was offered "all new unders": T-shirts, boxer briefs, and socks.

There were 5 to 7 volunteers who participated each day and helped everyone follow safety and behavior guidelines. Additionally, they ensured all guests and volunteers complied with the current CDC COVID-19 recommendations by cleaning, sanitizing and maintain social distances.

Did you know?

- 93% of people experiencing homelessness in Sacramento are originally from Sacramento or were long-term residents
- Over 20% of the homeless population in Sacramento are families with children and of those families, 33% were living in vehicles. Families with children are the fastest growing demographic experiencing homelessness.
- Around 40% of Sacramento's homeless youth identify as LGBT (The national number of homeless youth who identify as LGBT is between 20%-34%)
- In Sacramento, Black/African Americans are three times
 more likely to experience homelessness than the general
 population. American Indian and Alaskan Natives are four
 times more likely to experience homelessness than the
 general population
- Sacramento City Unified School District serves 43,000 students and of those, <u>13,000 students experience</u> <u>homelessness at some point during the school year</u>
- 25%-40% of unhoused people who are also employed either full- or part- time

 The 2019 Point-In-Time Homeless Count results suggested around 10,000 - 11,000 people experienced homelessness in the greater Sacramento area
